



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








Science and Math – Classes


Home Economics Prepares Girls for Future



For those seeking careers in trade atts, Shawnee High offers training in varied fields. Beginners in drafting and electronics study the fundamentals of their fields, while more advanced students specialize in fields such as mapping, architecture, and basic television. School offices depend upon the printing department to supply their printed office materials. The department also prints the Wolves Journal and sport programs. In the welding and machine shops students become familiar with the tools of their prospective trades. As its annual project, the carpentry department is renovating Harrison annex to be used as a new administration building. The auto mechanics department learns the basic skills of auto repair and uses these skills to keep cars in top condition. Offering to students the opportunity to gain on-thejob training, the Distributive Education and Distributive Occupations Departments teach the basics of the business field. D.E. students specialize in selling and distribution while D.O. students learn a skill or trade in three areas of study—a direct study of the student's job, public relations, and on-the-job training.





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
