As superintendent he serves on many state committees such as the Oklahoma Textbook Committee.

Mr. Jerrell Chesney, Assistant Superintendent of Shawnee Public Schools, works directly with Dr. Owen on all school projects. He interviews and recommends to *Dr. Owen* all prospective teachers and school employees. *Mr. Chesney* is also in charge of the federal programs.

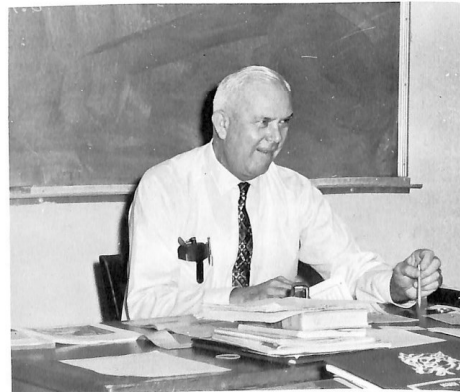

By taking a course in home economics or family living, students of Shawnee High have an opportunity to gain knowledge that will prove invaluable when they take over the responsibilities of a home.

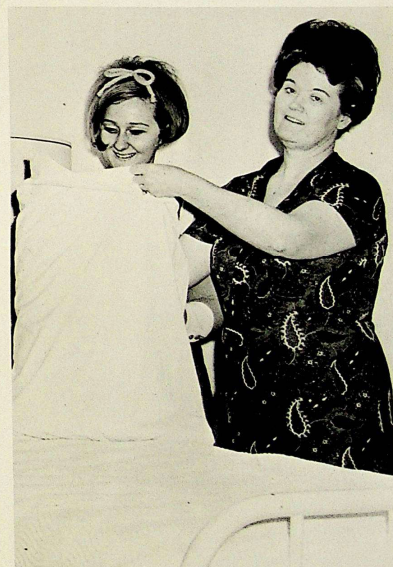

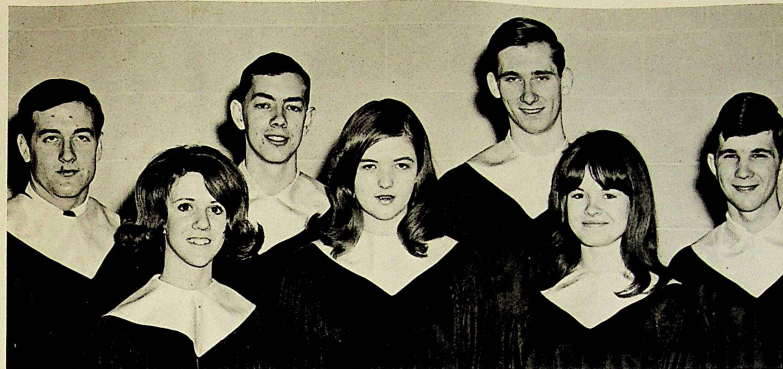

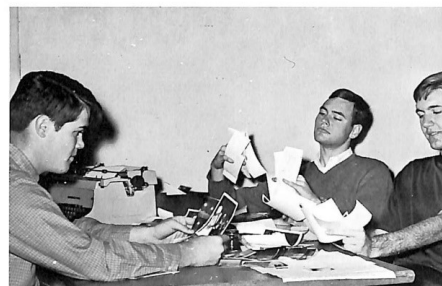

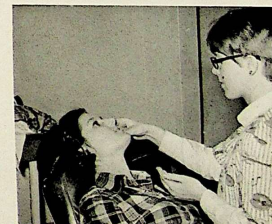

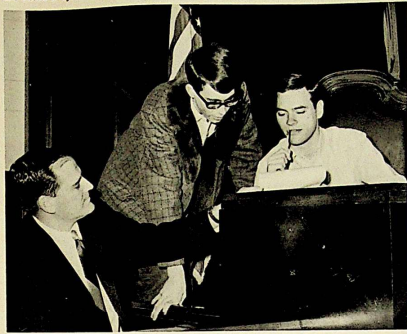

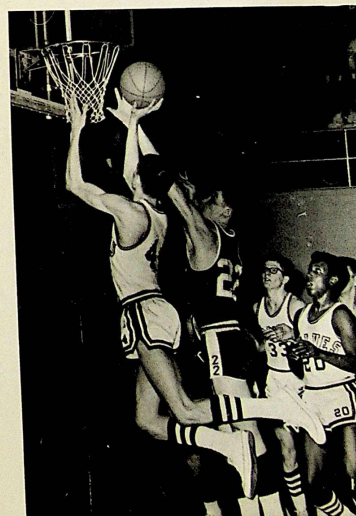

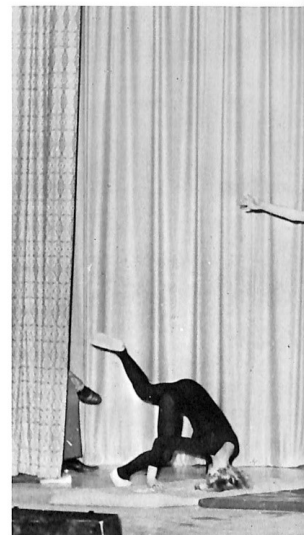

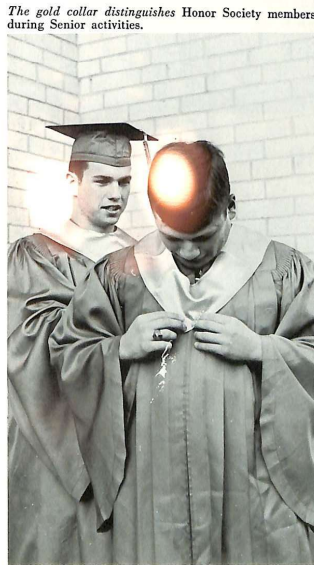

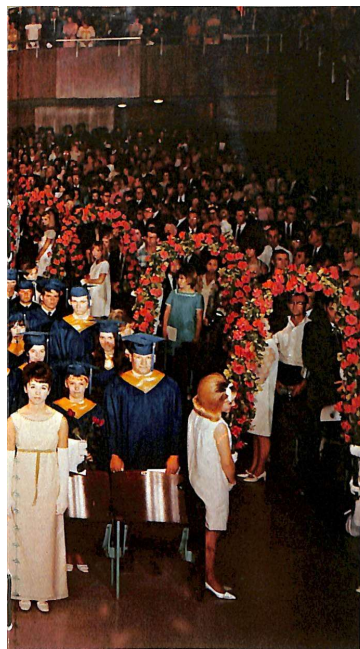

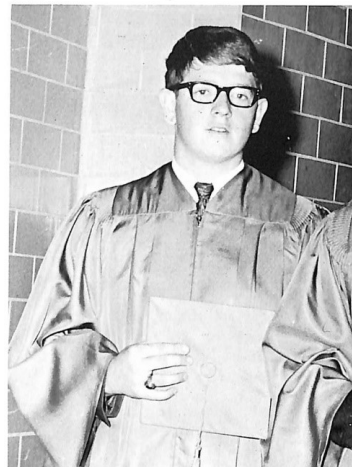

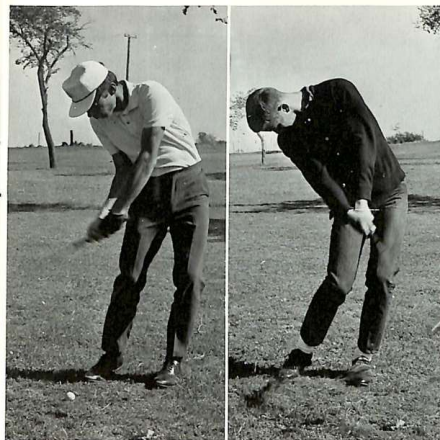
